Kay was born in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where she raised family and led a busy life filled with her dedication to art. She got the first colors and painted six musician dolls at the age of 5. Her first art classes were in junior high. Her education continued at Oklahoma State and Oklahoma City Universities, and the Philbrook Museum of Art in Tulsa. Her many art classes and workshops laid a solid foundation for her art.

She has done many interesting things—studied music, played piano, worked as a designer, grew exotic tropical plants. She has lived in many interesting places, including Puerto Vallarta. New Gallery Fees for 2016

The Gallery Committee has increased the jury fee and member and non-member non-sitting fees for 2016. The jury fee is now \$20 per show for members, \$40 for non-members. This fee has not changed in quite a few years and the committee felt an increase was appropriate at this time. The increase will help maintain the Gallery, as in repairs, painting, cleaning carpets, lights etc. The committee increased the non-sitting fees for both MAG members and non-members in the hopes that more members would become involved with the Gallery and functions that need more involvement by all.

Member non-sitting fee is now \$60, non-member non-sitting fee is now \$90 for each show, which is 3 months at a time. The Gallery Committee would rather have both members and non-members participate in the functions of the Gallery—such as sitting and assisting

with 4th Fridays—instead of paying increased fees. Also if members have any suggestions as to how the committee can benefit MAG, please feel free to submit them to magart@qwestoffice.net. They will be forwarded to the committee for consideration.

The Gallery Committee is always open to all members to join the meetings to see exactly how the committee functions. They meet the **second Monday** of the month at 10:00 am. Please check your calendar and plan to attend.

4th Fridays receptions now offer hot coffee and hot chocolate during the winter months. Wine and appetizers donated by members are also served. In the new year the Gallery Committee hopes to have the assistance of all members in making the Gallery represent all of the artists for benefit of all.
